


Easter is a Christian holiday which is widely celebrated across the world around the Spring Equinox. Like many other spring celebrations, Easter is associated with renewal, as it marks the rebirth of Jesus Christ in Christian tradition.

Easter has many customs which are built on longstanding traditions. As the consumption of eggs during Lent was forbidden, Christians began to paint and decorate them to give as gifts at Easter (the end of Lent) during the 13th century. In the 18th century, chocolatiers developed moulds and began to make chocolate eggs to gift instead. Now, chocolates in all shapes have found their place as part of Easter celebrations. Similarly, the Easter Bunny has been making appearances since the 19th century. Other common Easter motifs include flowers, which return to our gardens with the warmer weather, and animals such as ducks and chickens, which have babies in the spring. Lambs, which are used to represent Jesus, are also associated with the holiday.

While once just a religious holiday, Easter now has a strong cultural significance both inside and outside of the UK that extends past the Christian origins. Lauderdale House is delighted to offer this free trail as a way to celebrate British culture and engage our communities in arts and heritage activities.
